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Letter from the President

By Dr. Rodrigo Bressan, founder and president of the Ame Sua Mente Institute In recent years, mental health has moved beyond the confines of doctors' offices to become a central topic in public discourse — and this shift is no accident. Today, it is one of the greatest challenges facing our society, affecting millions of people silently — and often, in isolation.

In Brazil, we are facing a true epidemic: more than 56 million people live with some form of mental disorder. We rank first globally in anxiety rates, and depression affects more people in Brazil than in any other country in Latin America. Among young people, psychological distress, depression, and anxiety are increasing at an alarming rate — along with even more serious concerns, such as self-harm and suicide attempts.

This scenario, unfortunately, is aggravated by an increasingly fast-paced, hyper-connected lifestyle full of stimuli. That's why I often say: mental health must be a priority — with the same importance we give to physical health. If you have a fever, for example, seek help. But when the suffering is emotional, it is not uncommon to assume that it will simply pass with time.

To address these challenges, we have made important progress. The enactment of Law No. 14.819/2024, which establishes the National Policy for the Promotion of Mental Health in Schools, is a historic milestone. We also celebrate the recognition of bullying and cyberbullying as crimes — a sign that society has a new perspective on the importance of this issue.

These advances, from a legislative perspective, are aligned with the purpose of the Ame Sua Mente Institute: to build a new culture of mental health in Brazil. A culture that values intervention from childhood, empowers schools as spaces for well-being, fights stigma, promotes evidence-based prevention, and respects neurodiversity.

Since our founding in 2018, we have moved forward with consistency and innovation. In 2024 alone, we trained 6,556 educators and psychologists in 2,209 schools, indirectly reaching over 178,000 students. We also expanded our operations through partnerships with state departments and like-minded institutions, such as Itaú Social and Instituto Unibanco.

We know there is still much work to be done and that the success of public policies depends on the collective commitment. But starting the conversation about mental health is the first step toward truly caring for it.

I appreciate the trust and support of everyone—donors, volunteers, institutional partners, board members, educators, psychologists, and the Ame Sua Mente team. I invite you to explore the results in this report and to join us on this mission.

Because mental health is part of life. And yes, it must be a priority.

### **Mental Health Crisis in Brazil**

Mental health is fundamental to nearly every aspect of life. It directly affects our ability to regulate emotions, face challenges, build healthy relationships, learn, and grow professionally.

Unfortunately, recent research reveals a deeply concerning picture. Mental health has become one of the most pressing public health challenges facing Brazilian society, requiring urgent attention and collective action. The data below illustrates the severity of the crisis and reinforces the need for structural change:

- Early onset:
  - **50%** of mental disorders begin before the age of 14 45% begin by the age of 241
- Anxiety: 26.8% of the Brazilian population – around 56 million people –

### Depression:

**5.8%** of the Brazilian population — around 11.5 million people — suffer from depression, the highest rate in Latin America.3

### Absences from work:

In 2024, mental health-related absences from work reached their highest level in the last decade, with a 64% increase compared to 2023 – totaling nearly 500,000 requests for leaves due to mental disorders.4

### Overall global ranking:

Brazil ranks the 4th worst globally in overall mental health.

About 34% of the population reports stress and emotional distress, with young adults under 35 being the most affected.5

Given this scenario, there is an urgent need to implement effective public policies and strengthen initiatives aimed at promoting mental well-being – particularly among vulnerable populations.

### Children and Youth at Risk

While the general mental health outlook is already critical, the picture becomes even more alarming when we focus on children and adolescents. Globally, 1 in 7 young people aged 10 to 19 lives with a mental health disorder. Depression, anxiety, and behavioral disorders are the leading causes of illness and disability in this age group.<sup>6</sup>

In Brazil, for the first time, reported cases of anxiety among children and adolescents have surpassed those among adults.<sup>7</sup>

**Suicide rates** also reflect a growing vulnerability: Between 2011 and 2022, suicide among youth increased by an average of 6% per year.

**Reports of self-harm** among individuals aged 10 to 24 rose by 29% annually over the same period.

**In 2023**, there were 1,310 hospitalizations for suicide attempts among young people aged 15 to 19.8

The worsening mental health of adolescents is directly linked to a range of factors that have intensified in recent years. These include a lack of investment in socioemotional skill development, persistent social inequality — with the risk of suicide among Black youths 67% higher than that of their white peers — as well as extreme weather events and prolonged social isolation. Together, these factors have created an environment that is increasingly hostile to the healthy development of young people.

At the same time, early and constant exposure to screens has been shown to interfere with cognitive and emotional development. This exposure is linked to increased anxiety, lower self-esteem, and heightened social isolation. Finally, prejudice and stigma still make it difficult for individuals to seek and receive help. Together, these elements create a growing sense of vulnerability that deeply affects the emotional well-being of younger generations.



## Social Media and Mental Health

Excessive use of social media has emerged as one of the primary risk factors for declining mental health among children and adolescents. In recent years, international research has shown a strong correlation between time spent on these platforms and the rise in mental disorders among children and young people. Constant exposure to unattainable standards, cyberbullying, and a flood of superficial content can heighten psychological distress—particularly among girls, who report higher rates of emotional problems than boys.

Scientific research has identified a direct link between time spent on social media and increased levels of anxiety and depression. Around 60% of young people aged 16 to 18 spend two to four hours a day online, with extreme cases reaching up to eight hours daily.<sup>9</sup>

The increased use of social media is directly linked to the growth in the number of children receiving treatment in public mental health services.<sup>10</sup>

In Brazil, the early use of the internet and mobile devices is also a cause for concern. The percentage of children aged 6 to 8 who access the internet doubled between 2015 and 2024, rising from 41% to 82%. Similarly, the number of children with their own cell phones has increased from 18% to 36% during the same period. Among the highest social classes, this rate reaches 97%.<sup>11</sup>

A systematic review based on international studies found that 72% of the articles analyzed linked excessive screen use to an increase in cases of childhood depression.<sup>12</sup>



Faced with the rapid growth of these behaviors and their impact, educational, scientific, and social sectors are mobilizing to raise awareness of the severity of the problem. The situation reinforces the urgency of public policies and initiatives that promote mental health from childhood, including regulating the use of technologies and strengthening psychosocial support networks.

### **Advances in Mental Health Promotion**

### Laws that strengthen care and prevention

Despite the ongoing challenges in recent years, Brazil has made significant strides in protecting the mental health of its population, particularly children and young people. In 2024, new laws and public policies further reinforced the country's commitment to emotional well-being and violence prevention.

### Mental health in schools: a foundational policy

Law No. 14.819/2024, which instituted the National Policy for the Promotion of Mental Health in Elementary Schools, established a link between the education and health sectors. In this way, guidelines were established for initiatives aimed at violence prevention, the promotion of psychological well-being, and access to psychosocial care in the school environment. This legislation represents a historic step forward, creating conditions for public education systems to implement integrated care practices, focusing on the holistic development of students and strengthening the role of educators.

### Bullying and cyberbullying are now crimes

Also in 2024, Law No. 14,811 came into force, criminalizing bullying and cyberbullying as forms of violence. The new legislation was motivated by the significant increase in cases that directly affect the mental health of children and adolescents. In 2023, Brazil recorded 120,000 reports of bullying and cyberbullying, a 12% increase compared to 2022.<sup>13</sup>

Beyond serving as a punitive measure, the law plays an educational role by promoting awareness of the impact of such behavior and contributing to the creation of safer, more inclusive school environments. Furthermore, the new legislation helps define the nature of interactions in digital spaces, where words and images have an amplified impact.



### A path under construction

These legislative advances are essential for consolidating a national culture of mental health. However, the effectiveness of these policies depends on local implementation, public investment and social mobilization. Valuing each achievement, ensuring the enforcement of laws, and expanding access to quality services are crucial steps in ensuring that mental health care becomes a daily reality in all Brazilian states.

The Ame Sua Mente Institute is a Civil Society Organization dedicated to developing evidence-based projects aimed at promoting mental health, reducing stigma, and supporting the prevention and management of mental health disorders. To achieve this, we place educators at the center of our initiatives.

Founded in 2018, the Institute has its roots in the "Cuca Legal" project, which, since 2008, has conducted more than a decade of research on the public education system with a focus on promoting mental health and preventing disorders in the school environment. The initiative was conceived by psychiatrist Rodrigo A. Bressan – president of the Institute – in partnership with the Escola Paulista de Medicina – EPM/UNIFESP. The knowledge gained over the years has provided a foundation for shaping our social impact initiatives.

We believe that expanding our understanding of neurodiversity and the complexity of mental health – together with the training of educators – is essential both for building a more welcoming school environment and for transforming the culture of mental health across the country.

### **Areas of Operation**

We operate in two interconnected areas that together drive a new culture of mental health care. By uniting knowledge, practice and purpose, we seek to promote lasting transformations in education and society, always guided by scientific evidence.

### education

Taking care of the mind is taking care of ourselves. The sooner the better.

Childhood and adolescence are essential phases for building a solid mental health foundation throughout life. At the same time, the absence of a culture focused on socio-emotional development and mental health care for children and young people could have serious consequences. Therefore, emotional and psychological well-being becomes the starting point for children and young people to grow up with a good quality of life.

In this context, we believe that the school environment is the ideal space to foster this new culture of mental health. Educators play a strategic role in this process, thanks to the bond of trust they build with students and the in-depth knowledge they have of their experiences and daily challenges. This makes them powerful agents of change, capable of positively shaping the development of children and adolescents.

However, we recognize that educators are not mental health professionals, so our initiatives are designed to empower them without burdening them with responsibilities that are not theirs.

We develop, implement and evaluate programs and projects primarily for educators in the public education network, through partnerships with the responsible public bodies and other organizations that share the same vision as we do.





## advocacy

## Knowledge is the best weapon against prejudice!

Promoting mental health, encouraging early prevention of disorders, and combating prejudice related to the topic: this is the purpose of our second area of activity, Advocacy.

Through campaigns, educational materials, and strategic communication initiatives, we work to promote literacy and raise awareness in civil society. We also develop projects aligned with public policy, aiming to transform them into institutional programs in partnership with Education Departments.

Our goal is to expand access to scientific knowledge, by translating it into accessible and direct language, which contributes to the reduction of misinformation. Additionally, we use various communication formats and channels to engage the school community and the general public in building a new culture of mental health care.

# education Our projects





In 2024, we reaffirmed our partnership with the Secretaria da Educação do Estado de São Paulo (SEDUC-SP, São Paulo State Department of Education) to bring the Ame Sua Mente na Escola training to teachers, school administrators, classroom supervisors, pedagogical coordinators and psychologists in the public school system.

We are the only mental health organization accredited by SEDUC-SP, via EFAPE (São Paulo State School for the Training and Improvement of Education Professionals), to work on the topic of mental health with educators and school administrators throughout the State.

Developed by experts at the Institute, the course offers a training journey that combines distance learning strategies with a high-quality, accessible hybrid model designed for scale.

Our goal is to empower education professionals to promote mental health, combat stigma, prevent mental disorders, and minimize the impact of illness among young students in the school environment. Additionally, we seek to support the well-being of educators themselves and offer support in managing mental health issues in the classroom.

This initiative is aligned with the Base Nacional Comum Curricular (BNCC, National Common Core Curricular Base), a normative document that establishes essential learning for Basic Education students.

### Introducing the Ame sua Mente na Escola project

### **Awareness Stage**

We began the journey by raising awareness among the heads of the Regional Education Directorates (DREs), with the aim of deepening their understanding of the impact of mental health on education. In this way, these managers, who are in a position of great influence in the Network, were able to mobilize educators from their Regionals to participate in the training.

Structured around the theme "Empathic Connections: Emotional Regulation and Nonviolent Communication," this stage involved 10 synchronous meetings between mental health specialists and educators. Based on the premise that it is necessary to know yourself to know others, our researchers emphasized the importance of self-care, emotional regulation and Nonviolent Communication (NVC).







### **Training Stage**

Developed by experts and researchers from the Institute's mental health team, the Ame Sua Mente na Escola training takes place through a selfinstructional teaching platform with synchronous classes. The course aims to make scientific knowledge more accessible and easier to understand.

The initiative trains teachers and school administrators in the public education system on topics involving mental health, such as mood disorders, anxiety disorders, ADHD (Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder), drug use, among others.

Comprising eight modules, the training program includes a range of multimedia resources to enhance learning, as well as educational materials that educators can use on students in both lower and upper elementary levels, as well as high school. These tools ensure dynamic and engaging learning throughout the journey.

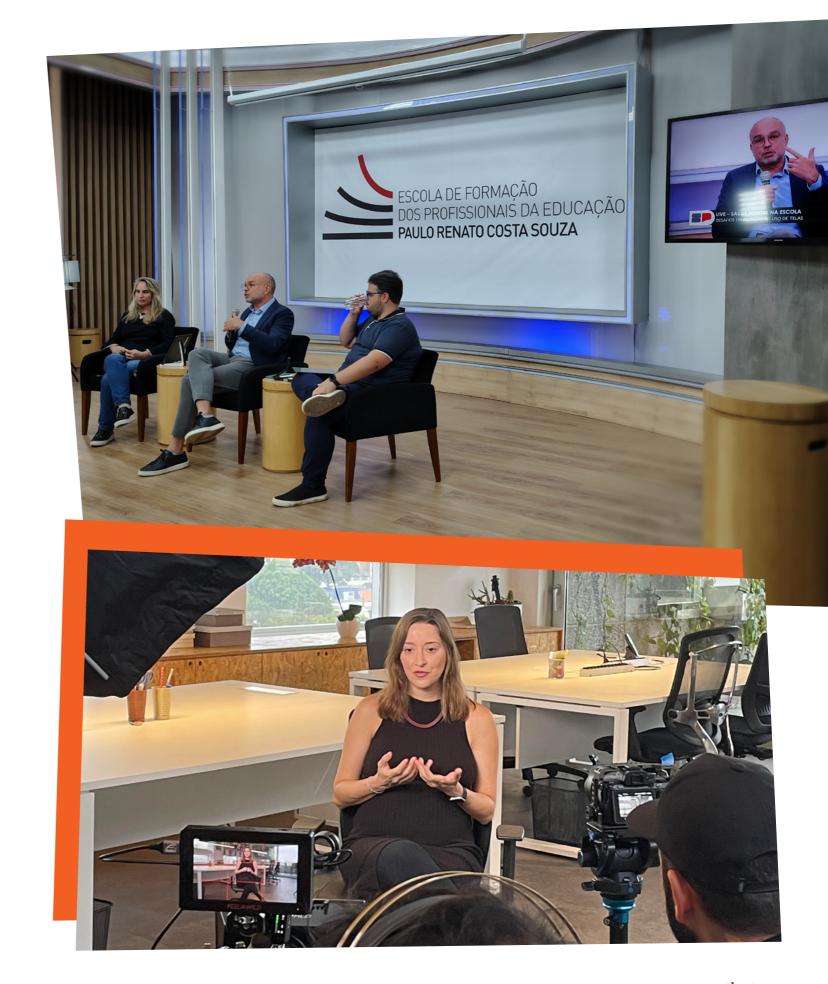
Additionally, during the journey, we provide additional content and offer synchronous classes with mental health specialists from the Institute.

Educators who complete or reach 75% of the course receive a certificate, valid for career progression, in accordance with current legislation.

#### **Resources and tools**

### Synchronous classes

Synchronous sessions with our experts offer a practical approach to theoretical concepts, facilitating the application of knowledge in the educator's daily routine, in addition to enabling greater proximity and interaction with students. The 2024 training featured synchronous classes that covered topics such as: "Mental Health at School and the Challenges of Excessive Screen Time by Children and Adolescents"; "Referral Protocol – How to Identify and Refer Potential Cases to the Psychosocial Assistance Network"; and "Educator Mental Health" – focusing on the training path launched in 2024, which addresses the importance of self-care.





#### **Referral Protocol**

The referral protocol is a valuable resource developed by the Institute in 2021. It supports schools in referring students who need specialized mental health services.

This instrument helps professionals in the field of Education analyze important indicators for a better assessment of students who show signs of mental disorders, thus favoring early treatment.

The Referral Protocol is also available on our website for any educator to use, regardless of whether they participate in our training.

### Social technologies

We offer course participants the Bússola channel, via WhatsApp at telephone number +55 (11) 991130019 -, a resource that provides concepts and guidance to help educators support children and young people who are experiencing issues such as depression, self-harm and suicide.

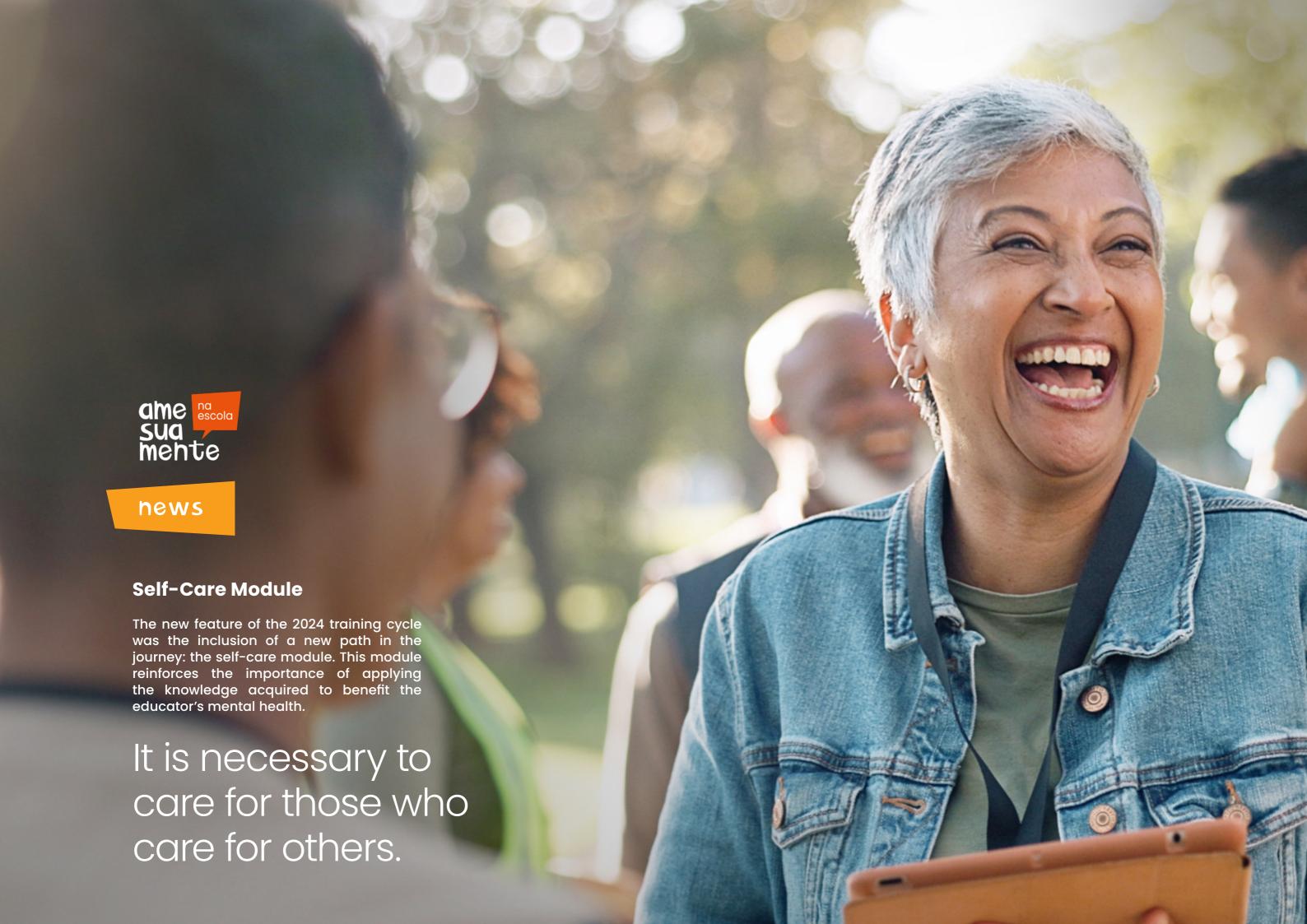
Microlearning pathways, complementary to the training journey, are presented in very simple and practical language.

#### **Toolbox**

The journey also includes supplementary materials to deepen knowledge, such as e-books, fact sheets, podcasts, games, and lesson plans, allowing educators to transform theory into practice with their students.

Across the board, communication plays an essential role in disseminating knowledge on mental health. Through specific newsletters, educators receive updated information on relevant topics, helping them address mental health challenges in the school context.







## These are the topics covered in each of the modules that make up the training:

- Mental health: definition, dimensions, causes of disorders and the role of the educator.
- 2 Anxiety disorders: neurobiology, management and self-care.
- Mood disorders: depression in childhood and adolescence, management and impact on the school community.
- Disruptive behaviors: understanding and managing anger and Oppositional Defiant Disorder (ODD).
- Challenges of everyday school life: approaches to drug use and prevention and management strategies.
- 6 ADHD: identification, neurobiology and management in the classroom.
- Referral protocols: role of specialized agents and the use of protocols.
- Self-care: importance of self-knowledge, stress and anxiety management strategies for the educator.

### Pilot training for psychologists

For the first time, we are offering the "Ame Sua Mente na Escola" Training Course to psychologists working in the public education system in the State of São Paulo. This initiative, which aims to expand the knowledge of these professionals to face the challenges of mental health in the school environment, was carried out through the partnership between Ame sua Mente and CONVIVA SP, a program of the São Paulo State Department of Education (SEDUC-SP)\*\*.

### Ame Sua Mente na Escola at Paraná

In partnership with the Paraná State Department of Education (SEED-PR) and with the essential support of the Fundação Itaú Social, which made possible the necessary investment to expand our training path in the Southern Region of the country.

The Ame Sua Mente na Escola at SEED-PR project aims to train professionals from the Department of Inclusive Education (DEIN) and its regional technicians.

It also includes the collaborative development of training materials, based on the most critical mental health issues facing the state education network.

In the future, a group of trained technicians will be responsible for disseminating the acquired knowledge to more than 2,000 educators and other professionals in the education network.

They are also responsible for engaging the school community in developing a culture of mental health promotion in the school environment.

## Scientific research proves the impact of Ame Sua Mente na Escola

The "Ame Sua Mente na Escola" Project was selected by the Center for Research in Innovation and Mental Health (CISM), in 2023, as the subject matter of the scientific research conducted by the Federal University of São Paulo (UNIFESP).

Through a partnership between CISM and the city councils of Jaguariúna and Indaiatuba, our mental health training course has since been implemented in the education networks of these São Paulo cities, with the aim of evaluating its impact on Early Childhood Education, Elementary Education, and Special Education.

In the 2024 evaluation, it was observed that, in addition to expanding teachers' repertoire on mental health, the training contributed significantly to increasing the perception of preparedness to deal with practical situations in the school environment. Before the course, only 18.4% of educators felt able to identify signs of psychological distress among students; after the training, this percentage more than doubled, reaching 40.1%.



\* CISM - Center for Research and Innovation in Mental Health - is the result of a partnership between the University of São Paulo (USP), the Federal University of São Paulo (UNIFESP), the Federal University of Rio Grande do Sul (UFRGS) and the UniEduk group (UniMAX, UNIFAJ and FAAGROH).



In relation to specific disorders, advances were also significant:

- The confidence to deal with ADHD cases\*\* increased from 23.8% to 44.5%.
- Preparedness to recognize and manage conduct disorders increased from 13.9% to 38%.
- Confidence in **dealing with depression** more than doubled **from 13.8% to 38.1%**.
- Identification of anxiety cases rose from 15.3% to 42.5%.
- Another highlight was the increased confidence in referring mental health cases for specialized support: initially, 21.5% of educators felt prepared for this task; by the end of the course, the percentage rose to 32.6%.

The analysis of the project's results took into account factors such as: its effect on educators' mental health; stigma related to mental health; mental health literacy; identification skills; and case management and referral.

As part of the initiative, a mapping of public mental health services in both cities was also carried out. This work resulted in the development of information guides listing the addresses and hours of operation for primary care, emergency and urgent care services, specialized care, psychosocial support, and social assistance services.

## Creation of support materials for school administrators and educators

The lack of support materials for school administrators and educators facing current challenges led us to develop a guide on the topic called "Recommendations on Mental Health for School Management." The initiative was in partnership with Instituto Camino and Instituto Unibanco.

Developed based on multidisciplinary work by school administrators, psychiatrists, and psychologists, the material brings together six publications that offer practical guidance and effective strategies on essential topics.

Additionally, the publications provide guidelines for identifying early signs of mental health issues and recommendations on how to provide appropriate support to students who require specialized attention.

More than just a one-off topic, we believe that mental health should be a structuring pillar of the school environment. In this sense, the proposed recommendations address

a cultural transformation among the main audiences of the school community.

The material also highlights the importance of self-care for school administrators. After all, a manager who takes care of their own mental health is better prepared to deal with the stress and demands of the profession, which impacts the quality of interactions with their team, students, and families.

### **Support for school managers**

In 2024, we began developing a new distance learning course, specifically aimed at school administrators. Created in partnership with Instituto Unibanco, the new training path aims to expand the knowledge of these professionals, offering management strategies and tools to promote initiatives that result in a school culture that promotes mental health.

To institutionalize mental health as a strategic pillar of education, the course curriculum will be structured based on the material "Mental Health Recommendations for School Management," expanding on its core themes and integrating them into the daily routine of public school principals. Thus, the course will cover:

- Mental health in the school context;
- The role of the school in promoting mental health;
- Key factors and safeguards for a supportive school environment;
- Preventive strategies for mental disorders;
- Preventive strategies aimed at students and their families;
- Crisis management practical guidelines.

### Mental health training at the Escola Fundação Itaú\*

In response to the increasing interest in mental health, we have made part of the Ame Sua Mente na Escola training program accessible through the Escola Fundação Itaú platform for all educators associated with it.

The classes are aimed at teachers in the final years of Elementary School (6th to 9th grade), a crucial phase in the development of students. During this period, students enter adolescence and experience physical, psychological and socio-emotional transformations, in addition to significant changes in their school routine.

This initiative is the result of a partnership with the Fundação Itaú Social, which makes it possible to expand the Institute's impact throughout Brazil.

## Training for professionals from Sistema Único de Saúde (SUS, Unified Health System)

This year, we also made the Ame Sua Mente na Escola training available to professionals in the Sistema Único de Saúde (SUS) on the Fiocruz platform. This initiative is the result of a partnership with UNICEF and Fiocruz of Mato Grosso do Sul, through the Universidade Aberta do Sistema Único de Saúde (UNA-SUS).

### **Technology in support of educators**



Through a partnership with IDOr Ciência Pioneira, in 2024, we launched a microlearning path on depression, one of the most common mental disorders in Brazil and worldwide. This new journey complements the existing modules on self-harm and suicide, expanding the support resources available to educators. The content is presented in audio, animation and text formats, which can be downloaded, viewed and shared.

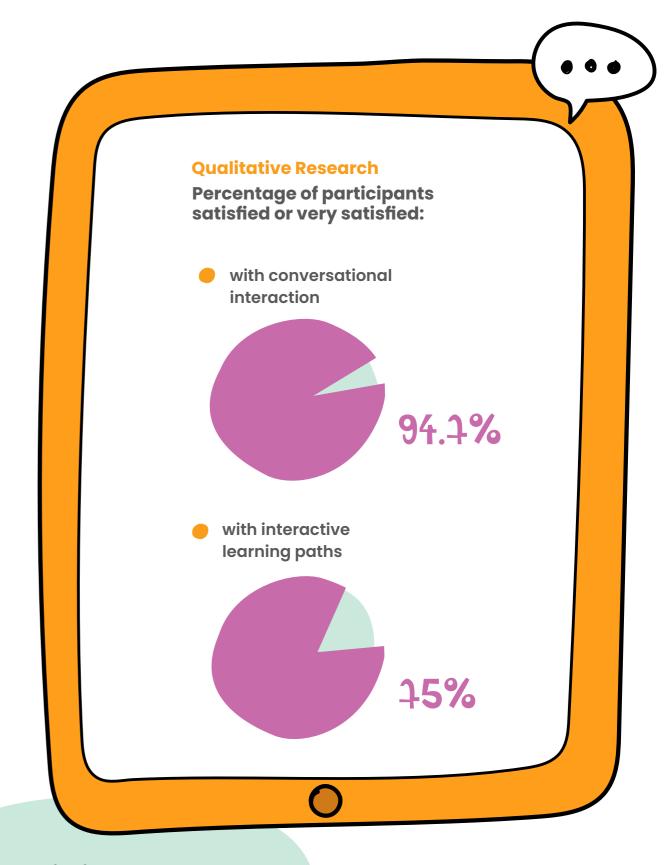
During this period, the tool's interactive functionality was also developed and tested. This initiative, in line with the continuous search for innovation in favor of education, will allow the user to ask the chatbot open-ended questions. Thus, with the support of artificial intelligence, the experience will become more dynamic and personalized.

Additionally, we evaluated the effectiveness of the Bússola Ame Sua Mente, and the results were doubly positive. Along with the excellent reviews of the current chatbot, we saw that artificial intelligence can make the learning experience even richer for educators.



## What is the Bússola Ame Sua Mente?

It is a tool developed to support educators in facing mental health challenges in the school environment. Through a free WhatsApp channel, users can access knowledge journeys led by a chatbot, which uses accessible and objective language.

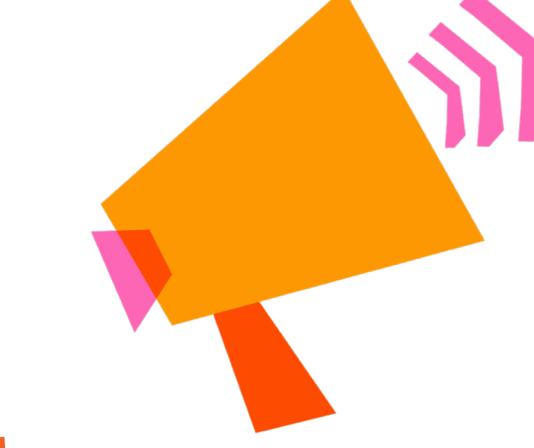

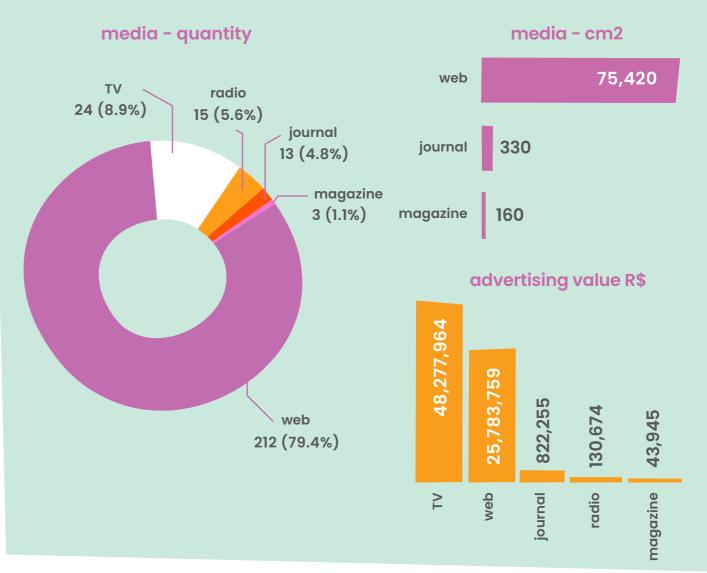
## The power of the press in promoting mental health

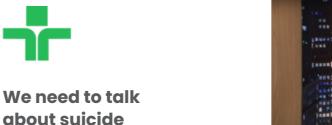

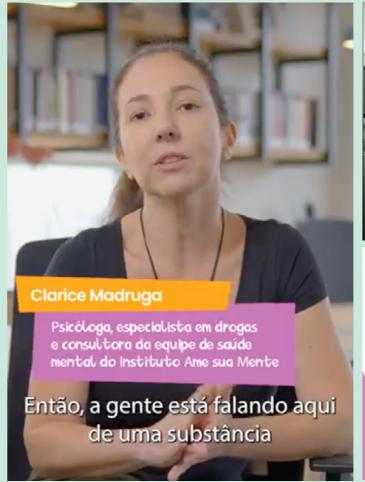

### **Campaigns**

Throughout the year, the Ame Sua Mente Institute developed strategic communication campaigns to mobilize society over the importance of mental health care. We take advantage of important dates to expand the reach of our messages. **Check out our main highlights:** 



### The best defense is conversation

### +855 thousand views | 55 thousand likes | 550 comments

In collaboration with Sociedade Esportiva Palmeiras, we produced an awareness campaign among football fans, mostly men. This initiative reinforces the importance of dialog in promoting mental health from an early age. Initiatives included producing a video with Palmeiras players to expand the campaign's reach on digital platforms, organizing a promotional event during a Brazilian Championship match, and delivering a mental health talk for coaches at Palmeiras' youth soccer schools.

### **Yellow September**

Yellow September, a national awareness movement on suicide prevention, was addressed from a new perspective in the Institute's campaign: "Saúde Mental é Vida!" ("Mental Health is Part of Life!").

Our goal was to emphasize that taking care of the mind is an essential step in preserving life, promoting socio-emotional development, strengthening bonds, and building support networks.

On World Mental Health Day (10/10), we expanded our message in a special partnership with the Instituto Mauricio de Sousa. ### A mental health ecosystem

The Ame Sua Mente Institute is a co-founder of the Ecossistema de Saúde Mental – Vertentes. A diverse group of institutions that came together to foster a culture of mental health care through social mobilization.

In order to drive systemic change, Vertentes prioritizes Advocacy — focusing on awareness, public engagement, and influence in public policy.

In November 2024, the Fundo Filantrópico Vertentes (Vertentes Philanthropic Fund) was launched and structured by IDIS (Instituto para o Desenvolvimento do Investimento Social) to raise, manage and allocate donations and sponsorship resources to mental health projects and programs aligned with its principles.

This initiative is made possible by the support of RaiaDrogasil and, to ensure transparent and strategic financial management, a partnership was established with Sitawi Finanças do Bem.

The Institute, together with its other members – Associação pela Saúde Emocional (ASEC), Instituto Bem do Estar, Instituto Vita Alere, RaiaDrogasil and SoulbeGood – reinforces its commitment to the cause of mental health, by working in an alliance that further enhances its impact.

## Mapping Mental Health Practices in Schools – Instituto Cactus

Our "Ame Sua Mente na Escola" training was recognized as one of the most relevant initiatives of the "Mapping of Mental Health Practices in Schools", an initiative of the Cactus Institute in partnership with Vozes da Educação. The survey, which interviewed educators to identify and systematize good mental health promotion practices implemented in public education systems, highlights our partnership with the São Paulo State Department of Education, through which we have trained more than 7,000 educators since 2023, when we were accredited by the Escola de Formação e Aperfeiçoamento dos Profissionais da Educação do Estado de São Paulo (EFAPE, São Paulo State School for Training and Improvement of Education Professionals) as the official mental health program linked to the State's Education System.

Each recognition strengthens our conviction in the importance of our cause and motivates us to continue promoting a culture of mental health care throughout the country.

### Cause marketing

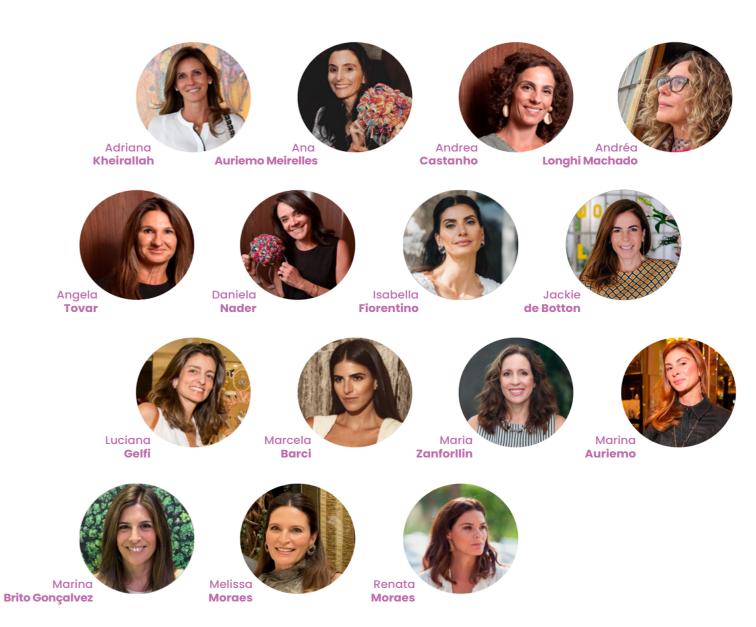
Reinforcing the importance of strategic alliances for the sustainability of our cause, we established a partnership with Shopping Cidade Jardim to sell social products that were part of three editions of the Gift Guide, a private shopper service of JHSF/CJ Fashion, with 100% of the proceeds donated to the Ame Sua Mente Institute.

For these initiatives, we created the Santa Pausa line — a collection of exclusive items designed for well-being and meant to inspire moments of connection. On Mother's Day, the Santa Pausa basket invited families to put their cell phones aside during meals. On Valentine's Day, the popcorn bucket set the scene for a moment of closeness, this time for two. And on Christmas, the hourglass brought a reflection on time — how we can create meaningful experiences of connection and well-being.

In 2024, people committed to and mindful of the importance of mental health found in the Ame Sua Mente Institute a place to devote their time, talents, and sense of purpose. These spontaneous and generous initiatives led to the creation of our sponsor group: by the end of 2024, 15 women—volunteers, leaders, influencers, and mobilizers—had accepted the invitation to elevate the visibility of the cause and to strengthen the Institute's sustainability throughout 2025. Together, they will create networks, promote events, and mobilize resources to promote mental health.

## Commitment to ethics, innovation and mental health

We reiterate our commitment to a healthy organizational culture, guided by coherence, transparency and alignment with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) related to our cause. This commitment was realized with the publication of our Code of Ethical Conduct, which highlights the Institute's fundamental values, such as integrity and transparency.

This document reaffirms our respect for and commitment to diversity in all its forms, our ongoing pursuit of excellence and innovation grounded in scientific and academic evidence, and our belief in the power of collaboration as a key driver of meaningful social transformation.

#### **Data Protection**

To ensure best organizational practices and demonstrate the seriousness with which we treat information, we conducted a complete review of our technical and administrative security measures, in compliance with the General Data Protection Law (LGPD).

We have added sections to our website dedicated to data protection, privacy, and cookie policies, as well as created a channel where individuals can exercise their rights, such as requesting correction, deletion, data portability, or objecting to the use of their data.

### **Technology and innovation**

Another important milestone was the creation of the Technology and Innovation area, accompanied by the launch of the Technology Board, responsible for ensuring the necessary support and debate to continue exploring technological resources that promote mental health in the educational context.

This new board, which joined our governance in April, includes six respected professionals from companies like Google and Boxl824. It also features representation from our main beneficiary—the educator—through Maria Isabel Faria, Director of the Central–South Regional Education Office at the São Paulo State Department of Education.

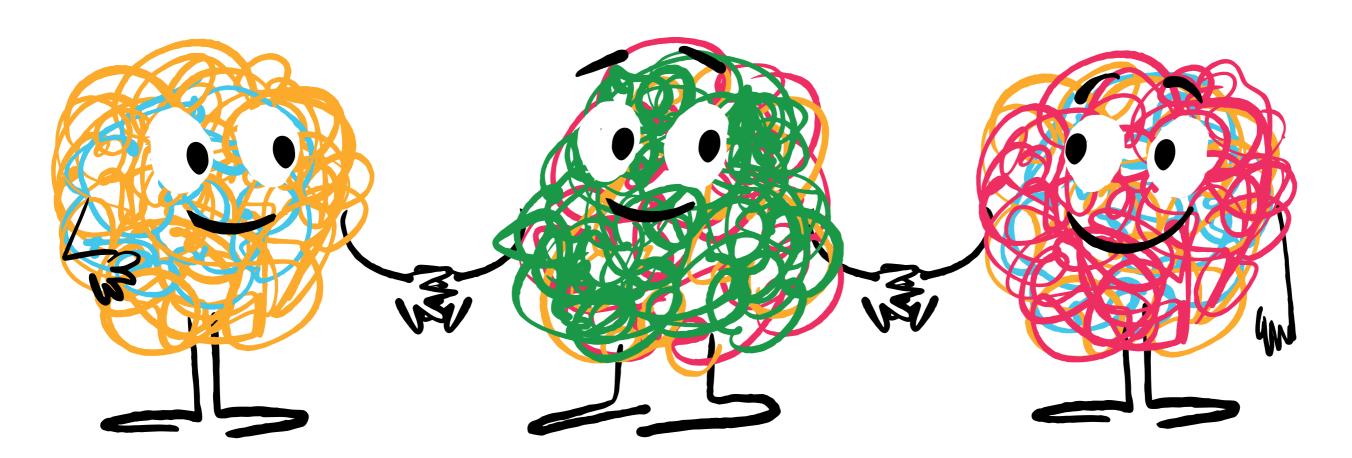

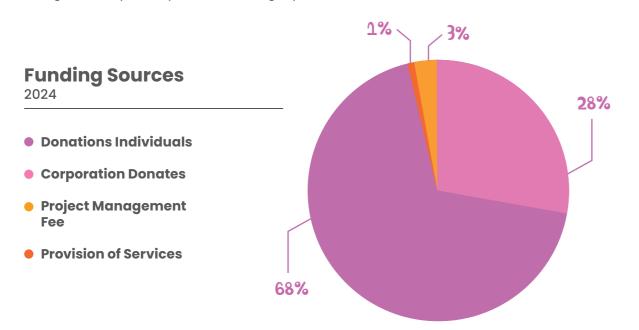

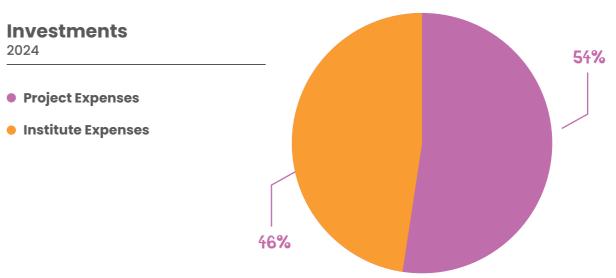
